## Instructions to authors

### Introduction

**Latin American Archives of Animal Production** publishes original scientific articles, reviews and short communications that are not under consideration for publication elsewhere.

This peer-reviewed journal will publish contributions from around the world dealing with all aspects of production and health in animals, such as genetics, breeding, organic, biological agriculture and sustainable production systems, apiculture, aquaculture, forages and pastures, animal health, physiology, reproduction, management and food technology, natural and genetic resources, agricultural economics and rural development.

The submitting (corresponding) author is responsible for ensuring that the article's publication has been approved by all the other coauthors. It is also the authors' responsibility to ensure that the articles emanating from a particular institution are submitted with the approval of the necessary institution.

**Electronic submission** (<http://ojs.alpa.uy/>) of manuscripts is strongly encouraged. The authors must be registered to log in in order to start a submission. Authors who have questions about using the electronic manuscript submission system or authors who are unable to submit electronically should contact Managing Editor ([archivos.alpa@gmail.com](mailto:archivos.alpa@gmail.com)) for assistance.

The most important thing you can do as you prepare your manuscript is to consult a recent issue of *Arch. Latinoam. Prod. Anim.* in terms of the acceptable format for headings, title page, Abstract, Keywords, Introduction, Materials and Methods, Results, Discussion (or combined Results and Discussion), Literature Cited, and tables and figures (including figure captions), which are described in more detail below. **Failure to adhere to the style and form may result in immediate rejection of the manuscript.**

Upon submission to *ALPA*, a manuscript is assigned to an editor, who enlists at least two reviewers to assist in the evaluation of the manuscript. The review process is confidential, which infers a bond of trust among the authors, editor, and reviewers. The editor is a trustee of the manuscript until the review process is completed and ensures that the review process is fair, thorough, and confidential.

1. Prepare your manuscript as a single MS Word file. The file should include the complete text, references, tables and figures. Any revised manuscripts prepared for publication should be sent as a single editable Word document.
2. Manuscripts should be written in English, Spanish or Portuguese.
3. Make sure all the characters in the text, tables, figure legends, footnotes and references are in a rather standard typeface and point size – such as 12 pt Times New Roman. Once a manuscript is accepted, a copy editor will decide the typeface and size of the different elements of the article.
4. Include all figures or photographs as JPG or TIF file with distinct characters and symbols at 500 dpi (dots per inch) into the text. Tables and equations should be in an editable rather than image version. **Tables must be edited with Word.** Equations must be edited with the Equation Editor.

5. All portions of the manuscript must be typed **double-spaced** and all pages numbered starting from the title page.

6. A list of non-standard **Abbreviations** should be added. In general, non-standard abbreviations should be used only when the full term is very long and used often. Each abbreviation should be spelt out and introduced in parentheses the first time it is used in the text. Only recommended SI units should be used. Authors should use the solidus presentation (mg/ml). Standard abbreviations (such as ATP and DNA) need not be defined.

## **Article structure**

### **Title**

In the title of the manuscript, only the first letter of first word and any proper nouns capitalized. The title should be brief and descriptive and not contain abbreviations.

### **Short title**

Abbreviated form of a title

### **Authors**

All authors must have materially participated in the research and/or article preparation. The statement that all authors have approved the final article should be true and included in the disclosure. Please clearly indicate the given name(s) and family name(s) of each author and check that all names are accurately spelled.

### **Institution where the experiment was carried out**

Present the authors' affiliation addresses (where the actual work was done) below the names.

### **Footnote.**

Author for correspondence: email. Institutions of other co-authors non-belonging to the same institution.

Indicate all affiliations with a lower-case superscript number immediately after the author's name and in front of the appropriate address. Provide the full postal address of each affiliation, including the country name and, if available, the e-mail address of each author.

### **Abstract**

The abstract, limited to 300 words in a single paragraph. All articles written in Spanish or Portuguese should include an abstract in English. Articles written in English should include a resumen in either Spanish or (resumo) Portuguese.

### **Keywords**

At the end of the abstract, a total of up to six keywords that describe the research, should be cited.

### **Resumen**

Articles written in English should include a resumen in either Spanish or (resumo) Portuguese.

### **Palabras clave**

At the end of the abstract, a total of up to six keywords that describe the research should be cited.

## **Introduction**

The introduction follows the abstract and resumen and should be short (500 words). It is to be used to justify the research and specify the objectives or the hypotheses that are to be tested.

## **Materials and Methods**

It is necessary to include a clear description of all the biological, chemical and statistical procedures used, or indicate the bibliographical citation where these can be found. The statistical model, classification variables and experimental units should be clearly defined.

## **Results**

The results may be presented alone or in combination with the discussion. To the extent possible, they should be presented in tabular form. In the text, it is appropriate to explain and deepen the insights presented in the results, rather than merely repeating unnecessarily numerical data that appear in the tables.

## **Discussion**

The discussion, which may be presented in combination with the results, should interpret the results in a clear and concise manner in terms of underlying biological mechanisms, integrating information published in the scientific literature. At the end of the discussion, a small paragraph should be included, giving the principal conclusions to be derived from the research and, if warranted, some recommendations or practical implication.

## **Conclusions**

The main conclusions of the study may be presented in a short conclusions section

## **Conflict of interest**

All authors must disclose any financial and personal relationships with other people or organizations that could inappropriately influence (bias) their work.

## **Acknowledgments**

Collate acknowledgements in a separate section at the end of the article before the Literature Cited. List here those individuals who provided help during the research (e.g., providing language help, writing assistance or proofreading the article, etc.).

List funding sources. If no funding has been provided for the research, please include the following sentence:

This research did not receive any specific grant from funding agencies in the public, commercial, or not-for-profit sectors.

## **Literature Cited**

It is recommended that a minimum number of references be included in the manuscript, selecting only those that are most pertinent and most recent. The bibliographical references are cited in strict alphabetical order, beginning with the surname of the first author followed by the initial(s) of his name(s). **All authors' names** must appear in the Literature Cited section. Articles published in magazines that are not considered scientific or have no editorial board should not be included as references.

## **Care and use of animals**

All manuscripts submitted to *Arch. Latinoam. Prod. Anim.* must be accompanied by a manuscript submission form certifying that any research that involves animals has followed established standards for the humane care and use of animals and must specify which standards were used. Only investigations that have followed high standards for the humane care and use of animals in research will be reported in *ALPA*.
